

BASE CLASSES	DESCRIPTION <i>(RA Year End Hi-Point Award Eligible Classes)</i>
RA Green Reiner	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder with no earnings in a reining event as of January 1 st of the current year and may show one or two handed in any legal bit. Modified pattern. In order to win the High Point Award, rider must not have won any 'RA Green Reiner High Point' award (Cannot win circuit award twice however, still able to compete with \$0 earnings in order to qualify). Non-Pro horse ownership rules do not apply.
RA Beginner Youth 13&Under	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder, aged 13 or under as of January 1 st of the current year, and cannot have any earnings in a reining event. May show one or two handed in any legal bit. Non-Pro horse ownership rules do not apply. Class runs concurrent with the RA Beginner Youth 14-18. Modified pattern.
RA Beginner Youth 14-18	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder, aged 14-18 as of January 1 st of the current year, and cannot have any earnings in a reining event. May show one or two handed in any legal bit. Non-Pro horse ownership rules do not apply. Class runs concurrent with the RA Beginner Youth 13 & Under. Modified pattern.
RA Ranch Reiner	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder with less than \$250 LTE. May show one or two handed in any legal bit. Class runs concurrent with the 'Never Won A Buckle' class.
RA Beginner Horse	Rider must be a valid RA cardholder. Horse must have less than \$200 LTE. May show one or two handed in any legal bit.
RA Limited Non Pro	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder with less than \$4,500 LTE.
RA Youth 13&Under	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder and aged 13 or under as of January 1 st of the current year. Class will run concurrent with the RA Youth 14-18.
RA Youth 14-18	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder and aged 14-18 as of January 1 st of the current year. Class will run concurrent with the RA Youth 13 & Under.
RA Limited Open SB Open	Rider must be a valid RA cardholder with less than \$10,000 LTE. Class runs concurrent with the SB Open. Rider must be a valid RA cardholder. Class runs concurrent with the RA Limited Open.
RA Non Pro	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder. Class runs concurrent with the SB Non Pro Prime Time.
SOUTH BRANCH CLASSES	DESCRIPTION
Ranch Riding*	Patterns will reflect Ranch Riding Patterns in the AQHA handbook. Rules can be found online https://www.aqha.com/aqha-rulebook . Some rules are modified from AQHA for the purpose of South Branch specific shows. Winner of the series will receive a buckle.
SB Non Pro Prime Time*	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder and aged 50 years or older as of January 1 st of the current year. Class runs concurrent with the RA Non Pro.
Never Won a Buckle (Series)	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder with less than \$250 LTE and have never won a buckle in a reining event. May show one or two handed in any legal bit. Non-Pro horse ownership rules apply. Class runs concurrent with the RA Ranch Reiner. Winner of the series will receive a buckle.
SB Short Stirrup	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder and aged 10 or under as of January 1 st of the current year. May show one or two handed in any legal bit at the walk, trot or lope. Non-Pro horse ownership rules do not apply.
3&4 year old Reining Horse Pleasure Non Pro NEW	Rider must be a valid RA Non Pro cardholder. Rules will reflect those posted below under special classes. Winner of the series will receive a buckle.
3&4 year old Reining Horse Pleasure Open NEW	Rider must be a valid RA member. Rules will reflect those posted below under special classes. Winner of the series will receive a buckle. Class may run concurrently with Reiner on the Rail Non Pro, depending on the number of entries in each class.

SOUTH BRANCH AWARDS	DESCRIPTION <i>(South Branch Year End Awards)</i>
Beginner of the Year	Rider must not have won any money or high point prizes in any reining event. Non-pro ownership rules do not apply. Will be awarded to the specific horse/rider combination that accumulates the most points in all classes throughout the year. Non-pro ownership rules do not apply
Volunteer of the Year	This award will be presented to the individual who donates an above average amount of time to volunteering at the South Branch Shows and helping them run smoothly.
Trainer of the Year	The recipient will be chosen based on nominations from membership, and participation at South Branch Circuit Shows.

Hi-Point & Circuit Award Eligibility

- Riders must show at a **minimum of 3 South Branch circuit shows** to be eligible for any circuit awards.
- Riders must volunteer a **minimum of 3 hours at circuit shows** to be eligible for any circuit awards.

Reining Alberta Branch Circuit Rules

Section A. Entrance Requirements:

- Both owners and riders must be current RA members to compete at RA shows.
- Open to all breeds and grade horses.
- NRHA rules apply except where otherwise indicated.
- AQHA rules apply for Ranch Riding and Reiner on the Rail Classes
- Non-Pros that do not hold a current NRHA Non-Pro card must complete the RA Non-Pro declaration form with their entry. NRHA Non-Pro horse ownership rules apply unless otherwise stipulated.
- All contestants must sign a waiver before taking part in any RA event.
- Cheques must be made out to Reining Alberta in Canadian funds. E-transfer to reiningalberta@gmail.com available.

Section B. Equipment:

- Riders are required to wear long sleeve shirt, cowboy hat, and heeled boots at all times while showing.
- No training equipment allowed in any judged class.
- Beginner Horse, Beginner Youth, Green Reiner, Ranch Reiner & Reiner on the Rail may be ridden one or two handed in any legal bit.
- Horses over 4 years of age must be ridden one handed in any Ranch Riding Class. Details below re: bit requirements.

Section C. Eligibility:

- It is the competitor's responsibility to be aware of their earnings and enter classes accordingly. Eligibility criteria are explained in the class list provided by the branch circuits and are as of January 1st, current year.
- RA classes use lifetime earnings, which are the total of all moneys earned at any reining event. Lifetime eligibility lists are available at <http://www.equistat.com/>
- Youth riders are determined as Non-Pro riders 18 years of age or under as of January 1st of the current calendar year.

Section D. High Point Awards:

- To qualify for Branch Circuit High Point awards a member must attend at least 3 shows in a single circuit and volunteer a minimum of 3 hours at Reining Alberta events.
- Points are earned by the rider (except Beginner Horse), regardless of the horse being ridden.
- A rider is not limited to the number of horses they can ride in any one class, but only the points earned on the highest placing run in each class will be recorded in the High Point tally for the rider.
- The horse, regardless of who the rider is, earns Beginner Horse Points.
- Not all classes qualify for High Point awards; each branch determines eligible classes individually.
- Ties for High Point awards will be resolved by a coin toss at the Reining Alberta annual banquet.
- High point awards will be presented at the Reining Alberta annual banquet.

High Point Calculations:

- 1st – 5 + ½ point for every horse placing lower
- 2nd – 4 + ½ point for every horse placing lower
- 3rd – 3 + ½ point for every horse placing lower
- 4th – 2 + ½ point for every horse placing lower
- 5th – 1 + ½ point for every horse placing lower

Section E. Stalls and Arena Availability:

- See Branch schedules for specific open riding times, move in time and show office hours.
- The show committee reserves the right to close the arena for maintenance at any time they deem necessary.

Section F. Show Management:

- Any concerns at the show must be directed to the show secretary or co-chair.
- No mistreatment or abuse of a horse will be tolerated.
- All competitors and spectators must conduct themselves in a sportsmanlike manner at all times.
- Show management decisions will be final and binding.
- All horses being ridden must be in full tack while on the grounds; riding double or bareback is not allowed.
- Horses in any warm-up situation must be ridden (no ponying alongside another horse).
- Horses are **NOT** to be tied in the warm up area; they must be accompanied at all times. Youth are not allowed to ride stallions in south branch shows.
- All show fees must be paid BEFORE you show each day. If not you will forfeit all points and prizes accumulated that day. Settlement must then be made BEFORE entries will be accepted at other shows.
- Please have all post entries in by noon on show day.

RANCH RIDING

GENERAL RULES: The purpose of Level 1 ranch riding is to allow a horse to compete in a field with minimally accomplished horses of the same level of experience. Regardless of horses age. **Riding 2 handed is acceptable in an O-ring snaffle bit. Must Ride 1 handed in a shank bit** *All other equipment rules will reflect Reining Rules as set out by Reining Alberta South Branch for the purpose of our Schooling Shows. This includes but not limited to any rules regarding leg protection and braiding etc.*

The purpose of the ranch riding class is to measure the ability of the horse to be a pleasure to ride while being used as a means of conveyance from performing one ranch task to another. The horse should reflect the versatility, attitude and movement of a working ranch horse riding outside the confines of an arena. The horse should be well trained, relaxed, quiet, soft and cadenced at all gaits. The ideal ranch horse will travel with forward movement and demonstrate an obvious lengthening of stride at extended gaits. The horse can be ridden with light contact or on a relatively loose rein without requiring undue restraint, but not shown on a full drape of reins. The overall manners and responsiveness of the ranch riding horse to make timely transitions in a smooth and correct manner, as well as the quality of the movement is of primary considerations. The ideal ranch riding horse should have a natural ranch horse appearance from head to tail in each maneuver.

Class requirements:

- Each horse will work individually, performing the required gait maneuvers and a minimum of three optional maneuvers. Horses will be scored on the basis of 0 to 100, with 70 denoting an average performance. Each maneuver will receive a score that should be added or subtracted from 70 and is subject to a penalty that should be subtracted. Each maneuver will be scored on the following basis, ranging from plus 1 1/2 to minus 1 1/2.: -1 1/2 extremely poor, -1 very poor, - 1/2 poor, 0 correct, +1/2 good, + 1 very good, + 1 1/2 excellent. Maneuver scores are to be determined and assessed independently of penalty points.
- The required gait maneuvers will include the walk, trot, and lope both directions: and the extended trot and extended lope at least one direction; as well as stops, and back.
- The optional maneuvers may include a side pass, turns of 360 degrees or more, change of lead (simple or flying), walk, trot, or lope over a log(s); or some reasonable combination of maneuvers that would be reasonable for a horse to perform or encounter during ranch work.
- The overall cadence and performance of the gaits should be as those described in GAITS, (SHW334 Ranch Riding) with an emphasis on forward movement, free flowing, and ground covering for all gaits. Transitions should be performed where designated, with smoothness and responsiveness.
- No time limit.
- The use of natural logs is encouraged.
- Posting at the extended trot is acceptable.
- Touching or holding the saddle horn is acceptable.

Ranch Riding Penalties. A contestant shall be penalized each time the following occur:

- One (1) point penalties Too slow (per gait) Over-bridled (per maneuver) Out of frame (per maneuver) Break of gait at walk or trot for 2 strides or less
- Three (3) point penalties Break of gait at walk or trot for more than 2 strides Break of gait at lope Wrong lead or out of lead Draped reins (per maneuver) Out of lead or cross-cantering more than two strides when changing leads Trotting more than three strides when making a simple lead change Severe disturbance of any obstacle
- Five (5) point penalties Blatant disobedience (kick, bite, buck, rear, etc.) for each refusal
- Ten (10) point penalty Unnatural ranch horse appearance (Horse's tail is obvious and consistently carried in an unnatural manner in every maneuver)
- (OP) Placed below horses performing all maneuvers Eliminates maneuver Incomplete maneuver
- (0) Score Illegal equipment
- No specific penalties will be incurred for nicks/hits on logs but deduction may be made in maneuver score.
- No specific penalties will be incurred for over/ under spins but deduction may be made in maneuver score.

3&4 Year Old Reining Horse Pleasure (Non Pro & Open)

GENERAL RULES: A good pleasure horse has a free-flowing stride of reasonable length in keeping with his conformation. He should cover a reasonable amount of ground with little effort. Ideally, he should have a balanced, flowing motion, while exhibiting correct gaits that are of the proper cadence. The quality of the movement and the consistency of the gaits is a major consideration. He should carry his head and neck in a relaxed, natural position, with his poll level with or slightly above the level of the withers. He should not carry his head behind the vertical, giving the appearance of intimidation or be excessively nosed out, giving a resistant appearance. His head should be level with his nose slightly in front of the vertical having a bright expression with his ears alert. He should be shown on a reasonably loose rein, but with light contact and control. He should be responsive, yet smooth, in transitions when called for. When asked to extend, he should move out with the same flowing motion. Maximum credit should be given to the flowing, balanced and willing horse that gives the appearance of being fit and a pleasure to ride. Junior Western Pleasure horses may be shown with any legal bit, or hackamore, with one or two hands.

Faults to be scored according to severity: a) Breaking gait b) Being on wrong lead c) Excessive speed (any gait) d) Excessive slowness in any gait, loss of forward momentum e) Failure to take the appropriate gait when called for f) Touching horse or saddle with free hand – if riding one handed g) Opening mouth excessively h) Stumbling or falling i) Use of spurs or romal forward of the cinch j) A horse that appears sullen, dull, lethargic, emaciated, drawn or overly tired k) Excessive nosing out l) Quick choppy or pony stride m) If reins are draped to the point that light contact is not maintained n) Head carried too high

Reining Horse Pleasure Penalties:

Faults which may be cause for disqualification: a) Changing hands or two hands on reins except with a hackamore or a snaffle. b) More than one finger between reins. c) Head carried too low tip of ear below the withers consistently for more than five strides. d) Over flexing or straining neck in head carriage so the nose is carried behind the vertical consistently for more than five strides.
